They voted on this year's play, auditioned in August, and began rehearsing in early September. Despite busy schedules filled with sports and activities, they showed up early, stayed late, and even practiced on weekends. Our motto was "Big Goals = Big Effort," and they truly lived it.

We competed at Wilcox on Nov. 10 and earned 3rd place, followed by our always-amazing community Dinner Theatre on Nov. 13, hosted by the Spartan Foundation. We ended the week with a festival at Ansley where we received valuable feedback and continued making improvements, including adding a fog machine and transition music. At conference in Holdrege, we came home as FKC champions! We were proud to end our season by placing 3rd at Districts in Gothenburg on Dec. 3.

No matter the results, our students learned powerful lessons about teamwork, grit, and confidence—and had

Students had a resounding "yes" to the request. Students collaborated to create framed works with modeling paste and acrylic paint showcasing trees with roots sprawling into the ground. At auction the works brought over \$1,100.

Litchfield school supported the student's goals by supplying the materials including modeling paste and frames so the artwork looked finished and professional at auction.

The committee had originally planned to showcase the trees for the theme and background of the event. They were blown away by the four works and at auction the winner of the bid was able to choose their favorite, making the bidding exciting for all.

Career Chats with EducationQuest and 4-H

December 9th, a few 6th and 8th graders participated in a Zoom call hosted by EducationQuest and 4-H. They heard from a Wildlife biologist and a Food Science specialist. Did you know that culinology is a career? The speakers shared about their "day in the life" and the steps they took to get to their current position. Students learned that both received their Bachelor's degree and can travel with their jobs. Recommendations from the two speakers included following their passion for their career, and that when you go to college, you may discover a path you never knew existed.

Connect the Dots

Schools from the area attended the Connect the Dots program put on by UNL Extension at the Valley County Ag Building on December 3rd. Litchfield had 4 students attend. They participated in career simulation activities geared towards career fields they selected from interest inventories. Area employers represented the 16 career clusters. They gave the participants information about their possible job in their career cluster. Part of the simulation, students were given "life happens" cards that may throw a curve into their ideal life--job loss, need more education, have ill parents, and have to move back home to help. A few employers shared their stories of how they got to their current position. Several reminded students that life and career paths are not straight lines. Many experiences were gained to get them to their current positions.

This state and federally-funded scholarship will pay tuition and mandatory fees at participating Nebraska colleges. Applications will be reviewed by Nebraska's Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education (CCPE). 

President Mitch Feldman called the regular meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

President Mitch Feldman announced and informed the public that a current copy of the Open Meeting Law is posted on the wall of the meeting room and indicated the instructions for those who wish to speak during public forum.

Marie Sweley moved and Katie Slack seconded to approve board minutes from the Regular Board meeting from last month. Motion carried 6-0.

April Gross gave the treasurer report as General Fund Statement beginning balance of \$724,649.21, general funds receipts \$37,142.40, and actual cash available in general fund \$504,794.91 in the district treasury.
