January 7, 2026, is the deadline for the February 14, 2026, National ACT. Go to www.act.org to register. Remember to study with our OnToCollege ACT Test preparation. Some students may qualify for an ACT fTee waiver. If your student receives free/reduced lunches, your student may qualify for up to 4 free waivers. Please have your student contact Mrs. Poland to inquire. Juniors and Seniors, remember to use the John Baylor OnToCollege website to review for your ACT.

Scholarships

There is a scholarship opportunity for students taking dual-enrollment college courses. Students participating in dual-enrollment college courses or early admit programs are encouraged to apply for the Access College Early (ACE) Scholarship if they show financial need. This state and federally-funded scholarship will pay tuition and mandatory fees at participating Nebraska colleges. Applications will be reviewed by Nebraska's Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education (CCPE). Susan Thompson Buffett Scholarship opened November 1, 2025, and closes February 1, 2026, at 5 p.m. (CST).



Prepare for the FAFSA with free programs and resources

If you're a senior, it's time to start preparing for the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). Be sure the senior applicant and parent/guardian each have an FSA ID prior to beginning the FAFSA application. FAFSA opened October 1 and is typically completed before April 1, depending on your college's priority deadline. Colleges will use your FAFSA results to determine how much they will award you in federal, state, and college-based financial aid.

LITCHFIELD PUBLIC SCHOOLS BOARD OF EDUCATION REGULAR MEETING November 17, 2025

President Mitch Feldman called the regular meeting to order at 7:15 p.m.

Members present: Mitch Feldman, Cole Lewandowski, April Gross, Marie Sweley, Katie Slack, and Alyssa Reynolds.

Visitors:

President Mitch Feldman announced and informed the public that a current copy of the Open Meeting Law is posted on the wall of the meeting room and indicated the instructions for those who wish to speak during public forum.

Cole Lewandowski moved and Alyssa Reynolds seconded to approve board minutes from the Regular Board meeting from last month. Motion carried 6-0.

April Gross gave the treasurer report as General Fund Statement beginning balance of \$882,382.30, general funds receipts \$130,176.88, and actual cash available in general fund \$724,649.21 in the district treasury. Payroll and claims in the amount of \$251,615.35 were presented for payment. Marie Sweley moved, and Katie Slack seconded the approval of payment of monthly claims. Motion carried 6-0.

Matt Drew gave the Principal/AD Report, and action items; Grandparents Day and Halloween Parade, Veteran's Day Celebration, Communication for newsletter and weekly bulletin, PLC, Teacher Work Day 11.14, Next year Volleyball schedule finished, Basketball schedule done but still working on some refs, and action items; update school Board picture, Election information, and Pavilion Update.

Cole Lewandowski moved, and Marie Sweley seconded to approve Policy 718.01; Motion carried 6-0.

Marie Sweley moved to enter into executive session to discuss personnel matters seconded by April Gross. Motion carried 6-0.

President Mitch Feldman reinstated the purpose of entering into executive session was to discuss personnel matters.

The Board entered into executive session at 7:57 p.m.

Alyssa Reynolds moved to motion to exit executive session and seconded by Marie Sweley. Motion carried 6-0.

The Board exited executive session at 8:12 p.m.

Alyssa Reynolds moved, and Marie Sweley seconded to adjourn the meeting at 8:14 p.m. Motion carried 6-0.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Education will be at 7:30 p.m. on December 15th, 2025. The agenda is a continuous agenda and is available for examination during regular hours at the office of the Superintendent.
